## Medical Missions: Alumni Provide Care to Underserved Patients

The story of a small girl – deeply malnourished and undertreated – stood out the most for **Lee Archer, M.D. '82**, during his sixth year of seeing thousands of patients while participating in Honduran medical missions. “There are a couple of patients each year with overwhelming problems,” Dr. Archer said.

With the help of the mission team, physicians were able to put tubes in her ears and pull her teeth, and a nutritionist arranged for supplements. When Dr. Archer returned the next year, he was pleased to see that the girl was doing wonderful.

On Dr. Archer’s most recent trip, 39 people traveled to San Marcos, Honduras. They coordinated with local churches and scheduled about 250 appointments each day for those with the most needs. But that didn’t stop countless more from lining the street of the clinic wanting to be treated.

The group was able to see about 1,018 in San Marcos and 420 patients in a smaller community, most often providing treatment for headaches, arthritic pain and gastritis. They also fit about one-third of the people for eyeglasses.

Many more College of Medicine alumni are participating in medical mission trips to help patients receive basic medical treatment and medicine. **Don Greenway, M.D. '73**, planned for two years before

his first weeklong mission trip in the spring of 1997 and has since brought about 100 people each year to Trujillo, Colon, Honduras.

Organized into surgical, eye and dental teams, some stayed in Trujillo to teach both patients and health care providers while others went to the smaller villages for care. The group often performs several surgeries at the Trujillo hospital, and at least two Honduran children are brought to Little Rock each year for major orthopedic or heart surgery. The Trujillo hospital also has received a generator and x-ray and ultrasound machines with the help of the mission teams.

**Joe Stallings, M.D. '73**, who participates on the trips with Dr. Archer, noted his humbling experience.

“I tell people that the Americans who go on the trip get much more than the Hondurans who we seek to serve,” he said.

Dr. Archer felt the same way. “It’s common for them to want to give you something in return,” he explained. “Virtually everyone gives a big hug and says ‘thank you.’”

Steven works at The Breast Center of Northwest Arkansas and Sally works part-time with him on medical education, primarily breast MRI. A clinical professor of radiology at UAMS, Steven also is medical director of Aurora Imaging Technology in Andover, Mass. They've worked to educate physicians and technologists on breast MRI and have produced several educational materials. ## Alumni on Campus

**Richard F. Jacobs, M.D. '77**, a professor of pediatrics and president of the Arkansas Children's Hospital Research Institute (ACHRI), has been named chairman of the Department of Pediatrics. Dr. Jacobs has served as interim chairman since September 2006, when then-chair, **Debra H. Fiser, M.D. '77**, was named College of Medicine dean. Dr. Jacobs is the Horace C. Cabe Professor of Pediatrics and a nationally known researcher and specialist in infectious diseases. He joined the faculty in 1982.

**Nicholas Lang, M.D. '73**, has been named chief medical officer of UAMS Medical Center. He was chief of staff at the Central Arkansas Veterans Healthcare System from 2001 to 2007. Dr. Lang has been a professor of surgery in the College of Medicine since 1990. He also is a professor in the departments of Radiology, and Physiology and Biophysics, as well as in the UAMS College of Public Health's Department of Environmental and Occupational Health.

**Joe Thompson, M.D. '89, M.P.H.**, was reappointed as Arkansas' top medical officer in July by Gov. Mike Beebe, who took office this year. The state's chief health officer since 2005, Dr. Thompson was appointed to the newly renamed position of state surgeon general. He has been a leader on efforts to prevent childhood obesity and to ban indoor smoking. The associate professor of pediatrics also serves as director of the Arkansas Center for Health Improvement.

The new Ed Roberson Heart Center at Houston Northwest Medical Center was dedicated in June, honoring the late **Ed Roberson, M.D. '52**. Dr. Roberson was a founder of the hospital, where he was affectionately known as "Dr. Ed." He died in 2005.

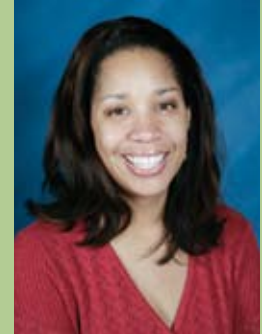

### Fuller

It seemed natural for **Dale Fuller, M.D. '75**, to choose a hammer over a scalpel. After all, he worked every Saturday growing up for the family business, Fuller and Son Hardware & Lumber, which his grandfather started in 1921. Dr. Fuller also sang professionally on a national circuit for 16 years with his three brothers before he decided to pursue medicine. It was simply the care of Dr. Fletcher Watson, an OB/GYN who delivered Dr. Fuller's own children that led him to medical school. "It was just the inspiration from a fine physician," he said.

## Campaign to Support ALS Research

A fund to support basic and clinical research into Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) has been established in honor of businessman, civic leader and longtime UAMS supporter Tommy May.

Four College of Medicine (COM) alumni are among more than 125 board members of Simmons First National Bank and Simmons First National Corp. who have participated in the effort, raising 1.5 million for COM research programs. The campaign is now reaching out to others who want to pay tribute to May, the chairman and CEO of Simmons whose long record of service includes the UA Board of Trustees and UAMS boards. May was diagnosed with ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease, in late 2005.

"Tommy May has been a selfless, exceptional leader for all of Arkansas," says **John Lytle, M.D. '82**, a Simmons board member from Pine Bluff. "My colleagues and I were eager to honor him while helping advance the understanding of this devastating disease. UAMS researchers are doing excellent studies into ALS,

and we are hopeful there will someday be a cure." Other alumni participants are **David Pyle, M.D. '83**, and **Ben Owens, M.D. '84**, both of Jonesboro, and **Phillip Stone, M.D. '77**, of Conway.

The fund will support basic science research led by John Crow, Ph.D., a professor of pharmacology and toxicology, and clinical research led by Stacy Rudnicki, M.D., an associate professor of neurology and director of the MDA/Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) Research and Clinical Center.

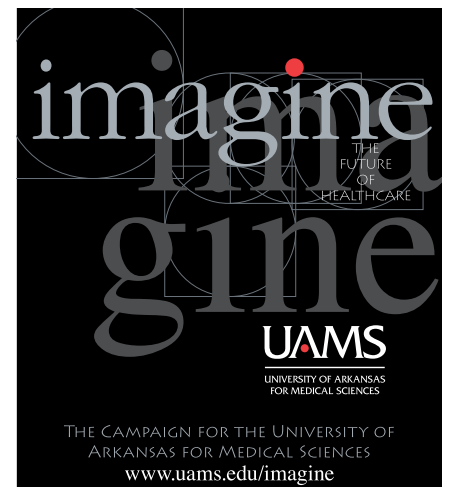
